

On-line Tourism Agents (OTA) have an increasing impact on booking and sales. Different to the traditional channel of Tour Operators that had little relevance for micro-services in rural tourism, OTAs are dealing well with this size of business. They compete in the formerly captive market and competence of Rural Tourism associations.

Buxton is one of most popular tourist destinations in the Peak District famed for its natural spring water and Georgian architecture. The town was founded by the Romans who called it Aquae Arnemetiae. It was the fifth Duke of Devonshire who put Buxton on the map with development in 1780s - the centrepiece being the Georgian Crescent.

The University of Derby's Buxton campus is set under the Devonshire Dome which is the largest unsupported dome in the country with a diameter of 174ft and open to visitors. Guided tours, a bistro, fine dining and spa and beauty treatments are available to book. The Old Court House and George Street & Quadrant area is home to a wealth of great places to eat, whilst the Cavendish Arcade features a range of independent boutiques.

The town's magnificent architecture includes The Pavilion Gardens, 23 acres of award winning ornamental gardens including serpentine walkways, play areas, lake & a miniature railway. There is a historic Winter Gardens linking the Opera House with the main complex. The building houses a bistro, Art Café, Gallery in the Gardens, retail area & Tourist Information Centre.

#### **PUBLIC TRANSPORT**

## By air

Manchester Airport - train from Airport station to Manchester Piccadilly,
change there for Buxton

Doncaster Sheffield Airport - catch the 707 shuttle bus Airport to Doncaster train station,
every 30 minutes. From Doncaster train station get a train to Buxton - you will need to
change trains at Stockport train station
Leeds Bradford Airport
East Midlands Airport

## By road

From the M1 North – Exit junction 29 and follow the A617 to Chesterfield. Then follow the A619 onto the A6 to Buxton. The hotel is in the town centre next to the train station

From the M1 South – Exit at junction 23a onto the A50 and then A38 towards Derby. In Derby follow the signs for A52 Ashbourne and then the A515 to Buxton. The hotel is in the town centre next to the train station

From the South West – Take M5 north to the M6 and exit at junction 15. Follow A500 towards Newcastle-under-Lyme and then the A53 to Buxton. The hotel is in the town centre next to the train station

#### By bus

The Transpeak - which links Derby, Matlock, Bakewell and Buxton every hour, with some journeys continuing on to Stockport and Manchester

A National Express Coach service also runs from Chesterfield to Heathrow & Gatwick Airports 6 times a day

The Skyline 199 bus from Manchester Airport directly to Buxton, every 30 minutes - £10.10 return (£5.20 single)
